Thai Enquirer Summary

Political News

- Today is a crucial day for the ongoing political unrest in Thailand for 2 reasons
 - ❖ The parliament is set to hold a 2-days special meeting to deliberate and seek some kind of possible solution for the ongoing political unrest
 - ❖ The ‘Khana Rasadorn’ has announced its plans to march from Samyarn intersection to the German embassy located on Sathorn road at around 17:00 hrs.
 - The problem with this march is that the pro-government who are calling themselves as ‘pro-monarchy’ has come out to say that they will march to the German Embassy by 14:00 hrs.
- The planned 2-days parliamentary debate that is set to start today in the ‘extraordinary’ session of the parliament, is something that the public must keep their eyes on as this is something that embattled Prime Minister Prayut Chan-o-cha hopes would help defuse the ongoing political crisis.
 - ❖ The government and the senate will get 15-hours of debate time
 - ❖ The opposition will get a combined 8-hours of debate time

- ❖ The opposition Pheu Thai Party said it has prepared about 20 speakers in the debate, including party leader Sompong Amornvivat. Opposition MPs have been allocated 8 hours of debate time; Pheu Thai MPs will get 240 minutes or 4 hours of debate time, according to Pheu Thai secretary-general Prasert Chantharawongthong.
 - Prasert said his party will focus on the demands of the anti-government protesters, the use of high-pressure water cannons to control the crowds on the night of October 16, the alleged obstruction of a royal motorcade and the COVID-19 pandemic.
 - Prasert said Pheu Thai party will not mention the reform of the monarchy but will leave the issue to the Kao Klai (Move Forward) Party but hinted that the party will consult the Parliament President as to whether discussion on this sensitive issue should be held in closed session.
- ❖ The Kao Klai Party announced that it will propose an urgent motion seeking the formation of a special House committee to look into the alleged obstruction of a royal motorcade on October 14 when a motorcade carrying Her Majesty and His Royal Highness Prince Dipangkorn Rasmijoti travelled past demonstrators near Government House. The incident saw pro-democracy activists Ekachai Hongkangwan and Bunkueanun Paathon being charged with causing harm to Her Majesty the Queen's liberty during her motorcade on the day.
 - Kao Klai said the incident could be at the police's fault following the transfer order issued for 3 senior police commanders as it is unclear why that route was chosen and why no advance notice was given to demonstrators. He said it could be the case that demonstrators had no intention to disrupt royal activities that were scheduled to take place that day.

- ❖ It is said that the core coalition Phalang Pracharat Party (PPRP) has assigned Ratchaburi MP Pareena Kraikup and Bangkok MP Sira Janejakha to tackle opposition questions regarding the motorcade incident.
- The Internet Law Reform Dialogue (iLaw), a non-profit organisation, came out to raise scepticism that the extraordinary session of Parliament would resolve the political tensions in the country.
 - ❖ iLaw director Jon Ungphakorn said the extraordinary meeting on October 26-27 will not help resolve the situation. He believed that the government will use the debate to attack the protesters, ignoring their demands.
- Meanwhile, pro-monarchy demonstrators have urged members of the public to gather in front of Parliament tomorrow, to oppose an opposition proposal to set up a parliamentary panel to discuss reform of the country's monarchy.
- The pro-democracy organisers are ramping up protest as they called for demonstrators to join a rally at the German Embassy on South Sathorn Rd in Bangkok today after embattled Prime Minister Gen Prayut Chan-o-cha ignored their deadline to step down by 22.00 hrs on Saturday, with core demands including a more democratic constitution and reforms to the monarchy.
 - ❖ Protest organizers last night called on protesters to converge at Samyan intersection on Rama IV Road at 17.00 hrs. today and march from there to the German Embassy.
- The march to the German Embassy could be a flash point as the pro-monarchy or pro-government group has also called for its supporters to come out at 14:00 hrs. to be around the German Embassy (a move to block the moves by the pro-democracy movement).

- ❖ The German Embassy has not made any comments so far and efforts by Thai Enquirer to get in touch with the officials there has not received any response.
- Meanwhile yesterday saw a decent sized rally at the Ratchaprasong intersection which began at around 16.00 hrs yesterday and ended at 21.30 hrs after the call for the rally at the German Embassy was made.



- The weekend also saw some major trends that has not been seen in decades in Thailand.
 - ❖ On Friday evening His Majesty the King and Queen were seen thanking and telling some people who stood up in the student protest movement to show their allegiance as being brave.
 - ❖ The hangtag #KingKeepFighting was the hashtag used by the embattled Thai Prime Minister's operations centre at the weekend on a Twitter post with pictures of a walkabout by HM the King

- In an attempt to appease protesters, Gen Prayut on Friday lifted a state of emergency that he had imposed a week earlier that made the protest rallies illegal. However, protesters said his efforts to appease them insincere.
 - ❖ The prime minister’s office posted a note on yesterday to say Prayuth was not quitting. Thailand’s crisis is due to be discussed in parliament during the 2-day debate today and tomorrow.
 - ❖ Parinya Thewanarumitkul, a law lecturer at Thammasat University, urged all sides to take a step back from the political conflict and proposed to tackle the root cause of problems by writing a new charter to strip away of the National Council for Peace and Order (NCPO).
 - ❖ Parinya suggested that the dissolution of the House will provide an exit way for Gen Prayut on the condition that he must not again be a prime minister candidate of any political party. This way will help diffuse ongoing political tensions.

- Meanwhile, the number of royalist rallies has been rising, with almost daily rallies.
 - ❖ Amid heightened tension and a risk of clashes, a group called the People’s Centre to protect the Royal Institution or “Kor Por Por Sor” and allied networks

comprising 200 people staged a rally in front of the Parliament complex yesterday to defend the Monarchy. The Bangkok Metropolitan Administration (BMA) reportedly supplied 6 mobile toilet trucks and balloon lights for protesters.

- ❖ The group announced plans to resume rallies in front of the Parliament complex from today. Some had already been camped since last night at the parliament area.
- ❖ On her Facebook page, Thaya Teepsuwan, the wife of Education Minister Nataphol Teepsuwan, invited yellow-shirt royalist supporters to gather at Lumpini Park from 17.00 hrs on October 27 to declare their stance to protect the nation, religions and the monarchy.



- Separately, there are reports that more than half of Thammasat University (TU) graduates refused to attend this year's graduation ceremony scheduled for October 30-31.
 - ❖ Chalee Charoenlarnnopparat, deputy rector of Thammasat University, reported declining numbers of graduates who attended the graduation ceremony major rehearsal at Tha Prachan campus on October 24.
 - ❖ The University expects a 50-60 per cent drop in the number of graduates, out of 9,625 graduates in total, who plan to attend this year's graduation ceremony in which His Majesty the King, accompanied by Her Majesty the Queen, would

preside over the ceremony and hand certificates to the graduates, Chalee said, admitting that the rising political tension in which students campaign against the graduation ceremony and the screening process triggered by the COVID-19 outbreak are the major reasons for the decline in numbers of graduates attending this year's ceremony.

- ❖ Earlier, a group of Thammasat University graduates calling itself “Graduates of the people” urged others to join its campaign against taking part in the university's graduation ceremony.
- ❖ The group plans to take over the Lan Phon ground at the university's Tha Phrachan campus to celebrate their graduation in a different way.
- On the superstitious side, several clairvoyants respected by embattled Prime Minister Gen Prayut Chan-o-cha concurred that Gen Prayut's plight is riddled with challenges and troubles but the situation will improve if the embattled Prime Minister manage to pull through November 13, according to a source close to Gen Prayut.
 - ❖ Celebrity fortune-teller Phanuwat Panwichartkul predicted that political turmoil will spiral downward in October, especially from October 8 to November 6 because this year is a “pee chong” (inauspicious year) for Gen Prayut. He warned Gen Prayut to be careful of people surrounding him because of powers and conflicts of interest. Phanuwat told the Prime Minister to exercise extreme patience during the last 3 months of this year and watch out for his health, accident and one's intention to cause harm to him. Gen Prayut's plight is expected to improve after these 3 months, especially after February 12 next year if he could survive the current crisis, Phanuwat said.
 - ❖ In addition, Phanuwat said 22 out of 36 cabinet members are in good plight while 14 others are in ill-plight. He told the government to remain united and no one will be able to cause them any harm.

Economic News

- Academics have come out to urge the government to hurry diffuse flaring domestic political tensions or the country risking seeing its economy sinking further.
 - ❖ Asst Prof Anusorn Tamajai, director of the Economic and Business Research Center at Rangsit University, came out to warn that ongoing political tensions would likely to drag the country's economic growth to contract more than 8 per cent if the government fails to find a peaceful solution to the conflict, advising the formation of a non-partisan committee to act as a mediator for talks between protesters and the government.
 - ❖ Anusorn said the country's economic growth will see a contraction of 8 per cent if political demonstrations do not spiral into violence and affect investment sectors, domestic consumption and tourism. However, the economy may contract more than 8 per cent if the situation is spiralling out of control.
 - ❖ In his Facebook post, Somkiat Tangkitvanich, president of the Thailand Development Research Institute (TDRI), wants the government to take the first step in finding a solution to the current political crisis through a parliamentary debate in a constructive manner. If parliamentary mechanisms are proven to be unsuccessful, the next step to take is asking the people, the true owner of sovereignty through a referendum, citing the case of the Brexit vote as a good example.
- Budget carrier Nok Air's first hearing for its business rehabilitation plan is expected to take place on October 27 as its petition was granted by the Central Bankruptcy Court.

- ❖ Analysts are positive that Nok Air's rehabilitation plan has a good tendency to pass the court's approval as the airline has support from more than 50 per cent out of 500-600 creditor.
- ❖ Nok Air's major creditors are more than 10 aircraft leasing companies overseas, major shareholder Hathairat Jurangkool who offered the airline a loan of more than 3 billion baht in support of the company's rehabilitation process. If approved by the court, the budget carrier is expected to spend 3 months to draw up a detailed rehabilitation plan for submission to the court.
- ❖ The airline vowed to boost efficiency without cutting the number of employees currently standing at 1,517. Instead, it plans to hire more pilot and crew members in line with the plan to expand its fleet.
- The Thai stock index would continue to be pressured by 3 major factors---ongoing political rallies that continue for 7 consecutive days, the COVID-19 outbreak and uncertainties over the US presidential election, said Apichart Phubancherdkul, head of strategy research at Tisco Securities.
 - ❖ According to Stock Exchange of Thailand (SET) data compiled during October 14-22 over a flare-up of anti-government demonstrations, the SET index plunged 53.53 points from 1,267.14 points on October 12 to 1,213.61 points on October 22. The SET index's market capitalisation during these 7 days trading (October 14-16 and October 19-22) dropped by 3.09 per cent or 425 billion baht to 13,352 billion baht, with foreign investors being net sellers of 6.876 billion baht worth of Thai shares.
- The Public Debt Management Office (PDMO) has a public debt management plan of 2.3 trillion baht under the fiscal 2021 budget, says PDMO director-general Patricia Mongkhonvanit.

- ❖ Although the debt management figures are higher this year compared with last year, attributed to the 1-trillion-baht emergency loan decree to alleviate the Covid-19 crisis, with the remaining 600 billion left for fiscal 2021, the PDMO has been discussing this issue with market participants in order to prevent an undesirable effect on the debenture market, Mrs Patricia said.
 - ❖ Despite higher funding needs of the government for fiscal 2021 due to additional loans for relief measures and an estimated budget deficit of 523 billion baht, the PDMO can still enter the bond market to sustain market confidence, she said.
 - The Federation of Thai Industries (FTI) has a positive outlook for the electric vehicle (EV) industry.
 - ❖ The FTI predicted that EV sales will rise to 7,000 units in 2021 or more than 200 per cent from 2,000 units in 2020 as the arrival of more charging stations and lower production costs will drive down the price of EVs, said Surapong Paisitpatanapong, FTI vice-chairman and the club's spokesman.
 - ❖ The FTI expects investment in 100 per cent electric vehicles to start earlier than scheduled in 2022 by companies that sought from the Board of Investment (BoI)'s promotional privileges. The production of 100 per cent EVs is likely to happen next year, Surapong said.

- Thailand logged 5 new COVID-19 cases on October 25, 2020, all in state quarantine facilities, taking the number of total infections in Thailand to 3,736, with total fatalities remaining unchanged at 59, according to the Centre for Covid-19 Situation Administration (CCSA).

- ❖ The 5 cases are 4 Thai women returning from abroad and one 60-year old French tourist.
- ❖ Two of the Thai women, aged 36 and 39, returned from Bahrain. The third is a 52-year old house maid, arriving from the UK, and the fourth is a 40-year old house maid returning from the United Arab Emirates.
- Meanwhile the western hemisphere is heading for what could be the 2nd wave of the outbreak of the virus as cases in United States and European countries surge.
 - ❖ Europe goes through its 2nd wave
